Annual Meeting One of the Best

The Annual Meeting at Toronto was one of the best, with the largest attendance ever. Our Study Group meeting was our best to date, with 6 new members joining and 23 attending. Chairman Lew Ludlow opened with a report on the handbook status. We had sold 188 (more were sold after meeting) out of the 250 sales needed to break even. He commented that 500-600 new runs were added between Shaw's Handbook and his revision and over 40 more since its publication. (At the Board of Directors meeting the next day they requested the Handbook Committee to plan several future BNAPS publications including a complete revision of the RPO Handbook!! This will probably take two years for publication.)

There was considerable discussion of the RF factor accuracy and Joe Purcell agreed to be Chairman of a committee to revise all RF factors. At present the committee consists of all Study Group members and will function as follows: Everyone should send Joe a breakdown of what runs you have in your collections and the number of duplicates of each run. For RF 50 and below, you can estimate the number of duplicates if you have many. Above RF 50 please send an exact count of your duplicates. If we get data from everyone, we may even be able to run a statistical analysis. We discussed the probable need to broaden the number range, perhaps to 5 - 500 or more, but agreed this could best be decided after we get the count from the members.

We also discussed a need for more individual projects or studies by members, with the hope that several of these could be reported on at next year's Study Group meeting. Several possibilities were mentioned.

Although a financial report will be given in the next Newsletter, the Secretary-Treasurer moved that dues again be waived for next year and this motion was carried.

With reports from only 6 members, here is how the different groupings look in terms of scarcity:

Note that the rarest grouping is the Railroads & Steamers, with Newfoundland a close second. I would be interested in getting your breakdown.

The controversy continues over covers with multiple RPO strikes, with the main argument on whether the cover was delivered or returned. For letters which were returned undelivered, Ralph Jackson is tops with 8 strikes, but only 5 different strikes. The best record to date for all different strikes on a delivered letter belongs to Jim Miller (#47). As shown on the attached Xerox copy, his cover has 7 different RPO's all in one direction. This is a first flight letter from Regina to Medicine Hat in 1930. Note the error in the Regina stamp, with some cancels showing 1929 and other 1930.

"O For the Good Old Days" Corner

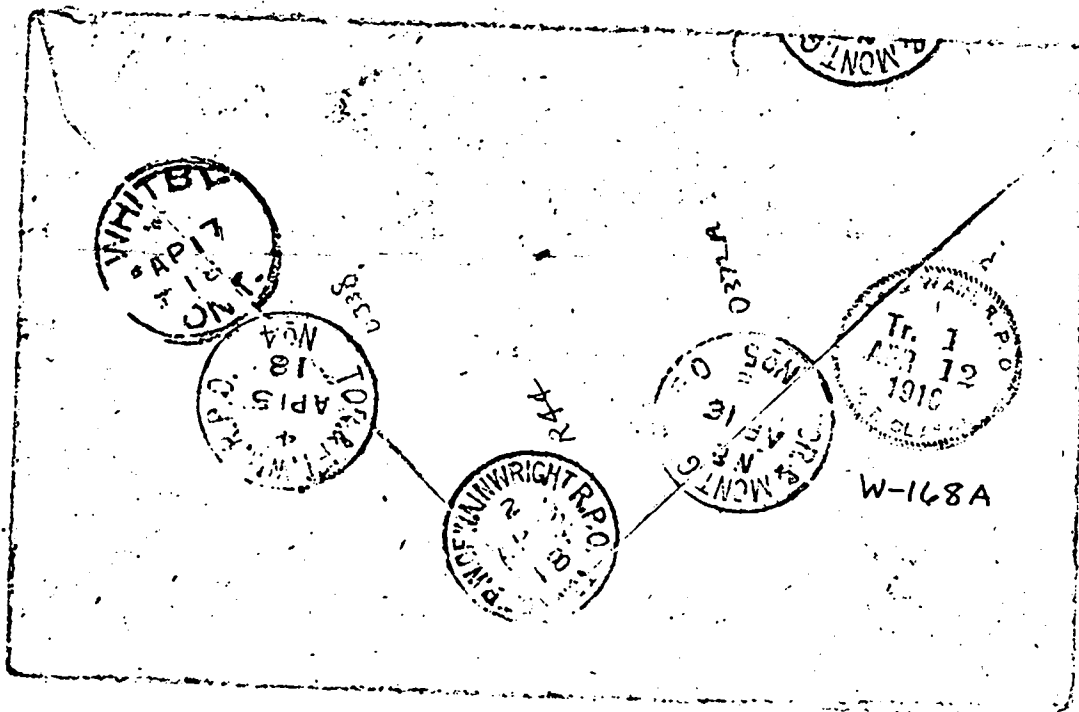

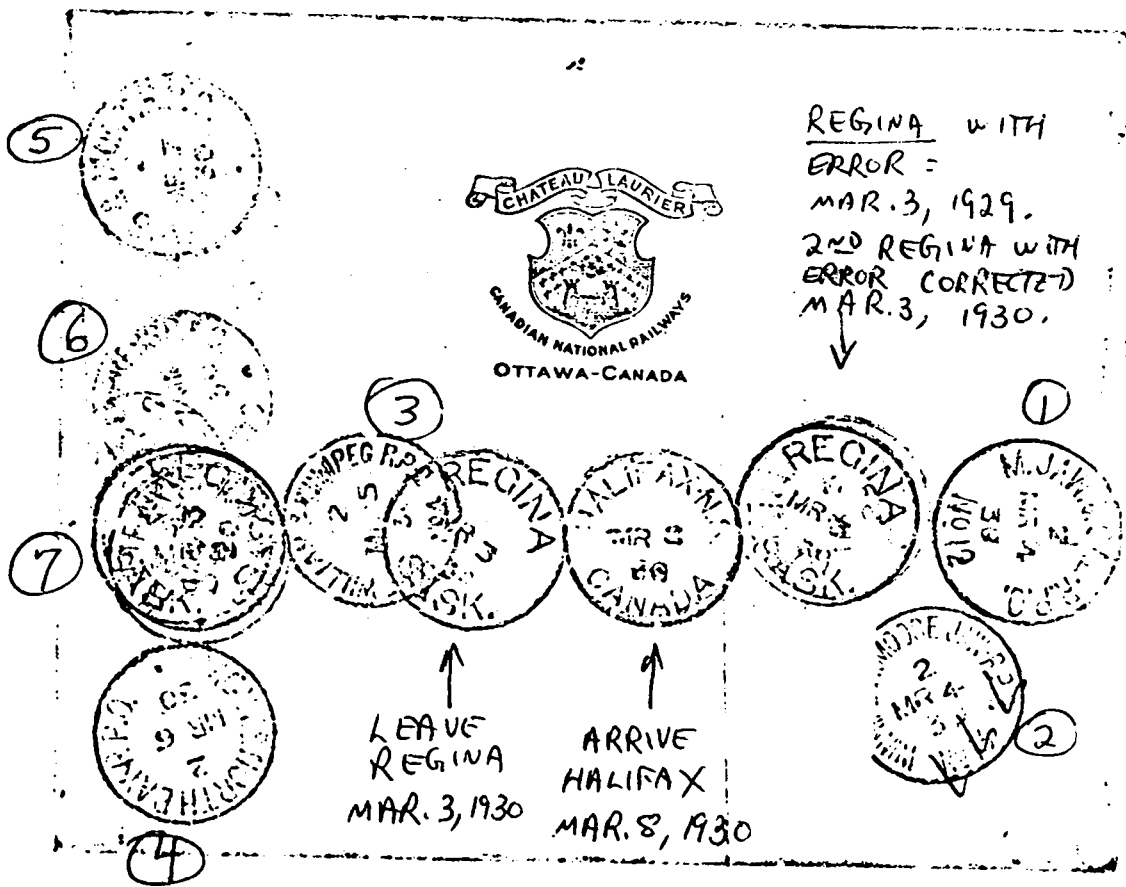

 MAR. 3, 1930.

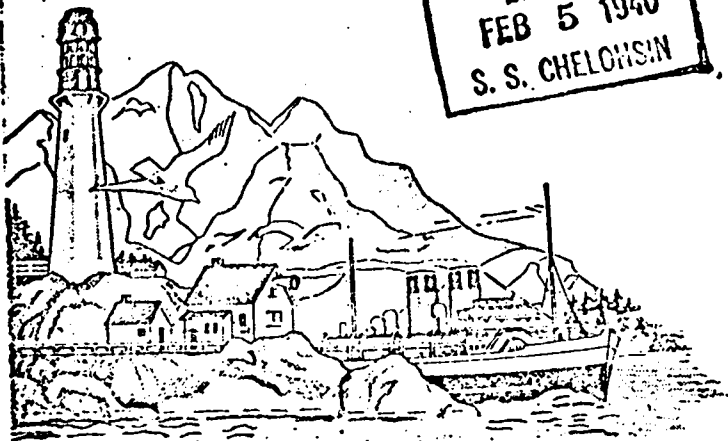
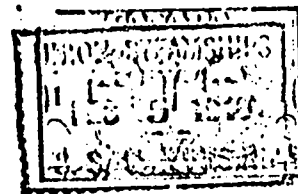

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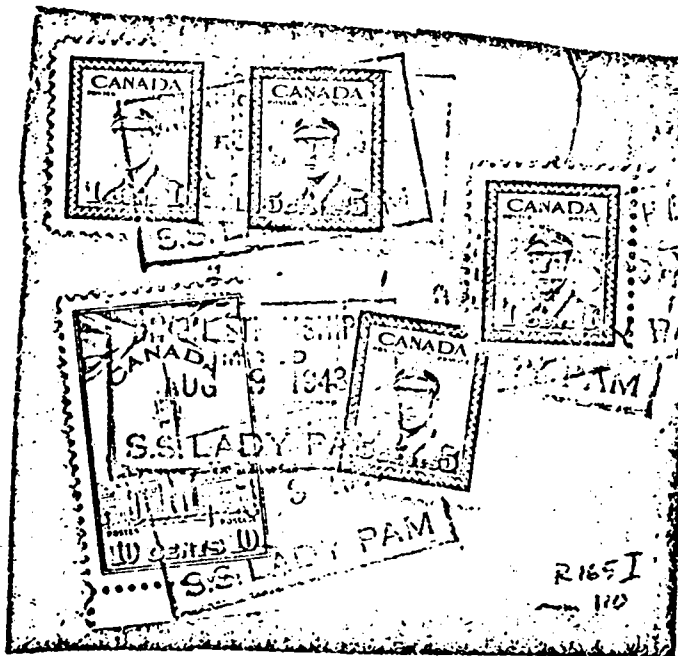
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
